The Fall Holiday marathon is over and we have survived. Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Simchat Torah have all concluded. We have heard the blast of the shofar, fasted, rejoiced and eaten pizza in our sukkah and danced with the Torah. At least many of us have. It was hard not to notice the decline in participation in these observances. Our models of Judaism, Jewish Community and participation have all changed and as a people and a community we struggle to adjust to new needs and definitions.

If I think back to the years of my childhood, my parents were not particularly observant. Pressure from children was needed to get them to light Shabbat candles. A *yahrzeit* or special Religious School event was needed to get them to go to services. But on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, they went to Temple. I don't think it was out of any sense of piety, but out of a combination of different factors, primarily out of expectation and habit. They went because their parents and their families expected them to be there. They went because their friends expected them to be there. They went because of the expectations of non-Jewish neighbors; it was almost a civic responsibility for them to be there. And they went because they felt that God expected them to show up at least on the significant occasions. And they went because that was their habit. That was what their parents and grandparents had done and what they assumed their children would also do.

Today, we by and large don't have those sets of expectations. Our neighbors don't expect us to be at synagogue in much the same way we don't expect them to be at church or mosque. Our families no longer really

expect as much of us; expectation being replaced with hope. And for most, Jewish observance is no longer one of our habits.

We always seem to be busy. And we still have expectations of us; participation on a committee, time for civic causes, obligations to soccer, or scouts or piano. Rather than a haven, the synagogue often seems to be a chore, another activity to be tended to, another obligation to be ticked off before we can get home and relax and find a few moments of quiet and relaxation with a conversation, a book or the mind numbing qualities of television.

Expectation and obligation are no longer compelling reasons for us. We shop for something that has meaning to us personally. Just as we shop for phones or clothes or diets or music that are custom-tailored for our needs or that we mix and match and select ourselves, so to do we search for meaning. Some find it in solitary meditation, others in social service organizations, still others through serving the needs of children or parents.

I find and believe that others can find that sense of meaning within Judaism and Jewish community. Within the wealth of our heritage we find teachings for individual meditation within our mystical traditions, methods for personal growth and character development within the mussar tradition, a responsibility for service and world repair under the concept of *tikkun olam*, guidance for living our lives and making decisions through Torah in its broadest sense. The goal of our community is to provide those opportunities to individuals and to groups to see and learn and grow from the knowledge and experience of our tradition.

Chanukah will soon be upon us. Chanukah means "dedication". It reminds us that we have the opportunity to rededicate ourselves to our community and all that it has to offer, as well as to all that we have to offer to our community. Let us know your interests, your needs and your desires.

You won't be alone. Let us search together for meaning, creating and designing programs that will bring each of us a greater sense of meaning and fulfillment.

### **COOKING NIGHT – JEWISH FOOD OF THE BALKANS**

On Sunday evening, November 8, at 7:00 pm we will explore the food and culture of the Jews of the Balkans. The Jewish communities of the Balkans (the former Yugoslavia, Albania, Bulgaria and Greece) were some of the oldest in Europe and date back to ancient times as well as having received a large influx of Sephardic Jews and later Ashkenazi Jews. In Slovenia, there were Jewish immigrants dating back to Roman times pre-dating the 6th Century settlement of the region by the Slavic peoples. However the Jewish communities in the Balkans suffered immensely during [World War II](#) and the vast majority were killed during the Shoah. Most of the remainder emigrated to Israel and elsewhere. We will explore some of the rich culinary traditions of this region that mix the original cuisine of the Romaniot communities with the Spanish traditions brought by exiles in the 16<sup>th</sup> century overlaid with the influences of the Turks. Because we will be cooking, reservations will be needed to insure that adequate supplies are on hand. Please contact Rabbi Feder if you wish to participate

### **BOOK NIGHT PEOPLE OF THE BOOK**

Join us as we discuss "People of the Book," By Geraldine Brooks, on Sunday night, November 15. This novel presents a fictional history of the real Sarajevo Haggadah, the oldest illuminated Sephardic Haggadah, created in Barcelona in the 1350's and then enduring centuries of travel from Spain to Portugal to Venice to Vienna and finally Sarjevo. Brook's' account will give us the opportunity to discuss the survival of Judaism and our own Jewish journeys and artifacts (physically and spiritually).

## JEWISH BOOK MONTH

Each year we mark the centrality of books for the People of the Book with Jewish Book Month, lasting from the 25<sup>th</sup> of Cheshvan to the 25<sup>th</sup> of Kislev, this year corresponding to November 12-December 12. To kick off Jewish Book Month this year, we will be having special programming within the Religious School. At 11:00 am on Sunday, November 15, our Religious School students will have the chance to travel back into time.

Our girls will have the chance to journey back to New York in 1914 as they enter the world of Rebecca Rubin, the first Jewish American Girl doll in Meet Rebecca. Our students will learn what life was like for a Jewish immigrant 95 years ago.

Our boys will journey back to Cleveland in the 1930's entering the world of Jerry Siegel and Joe Schuster as they create Superman in Boys of Steel: The Creators of Superman. They will learn about the Jewish influences on the creation of Superman. For both boys and girls lunch will be served, appropriate to the books they are entering.

During the program, information about Jewish book month, bookmarks, and information about our own reading goals and prizes will be distributed.

That evening, at 7:00 pm, there will be a discussion of People of the Book. By Geraldine Brooks. ## CHANUKAH

Chanukah begins on the 25<sup>th</sup> day of the Hebrew month of Kislev and continues for 8 days. This year, the first night will be Friday, December 11. Chanukah literally means "dedication", referring to the rededication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem by the Maccabees or Hasmoneans in 166 B.C. E. The Temple had been desecrated by the Syrians, led by their ruler, Antiochus IV and turned into a pagan shrine. The Hasmoneans or Maccabees, a priestly family living in the village of Modi'in, led a popular guerilla war of conservative Judeans against the Syrians and their Hellenistic Jewish sympathizers. Overcoming forces that were far more numerous and much better trained, the Maccabees set about restoring the Temple to its original purity. Basing their rededication on the description of Solomon's original dedication of the Temple, the celebration lasted for 8 days.

The Maccabees proved to be poorly suited for ruling the nation and generations of internal strife and intrigue characterized their reign. The Rabbis replaced the Maccabees as the hero of the Chanukah story with God, emphasizing the miracle of the small overcoming the mighty as well as the story of the container of oil that lasted for eight days. In fact, Chanukah is the only ancient holiday we celebrate that is post-biblical. The story of Chanukah can be found in the books I and II Maccabees, which are part of the extra-canonical collection known as the Apocrypha.

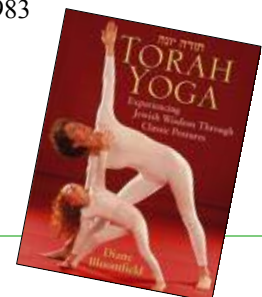
Chanukah is traditionally observed by kindling lights in the *chanukiyah* each evening, as well as eating food cooked in oil such as *latkes* (potato pancakes) and *sufganiyot* (doughnuts). It is also a time for playing with the *dreidel* or *s'vivon*. The custom of gift giving at Chanukah time is a relatively recent addition based on the older custom of *Chanukah gelt*, giving children small amounts of money for Chanukah.

## OFFERINGS

Raising children is one of the most challenging and rewarding occupations. And we all know that children are not born with a manual of directions for parents. Fortunately there are wonderful resources to help guide us. I am offering to facilitate a discussion group, "Raising Your Child to Be a Mensch." We will examine some of the inspiring resources including a wisdom packed book called The Blessing of A Skinned Knee by psychologist Wendy Mogel. "Judaism, with its two thousand year old perspective on family dynamics, can help you take your rightful place at the head of the family table" she writes. Through the lens of Jewish teachings, she shows parents how to teach children to be respectful, self disciplined, appreciative and resourceful. We will also share insights from lessons we have learned on our own parenting journeys. If you are interested in joining this group please come to the first meeting at my home (a few minutes walk from the synagogue - 245 Allison St. - a brown wood and stone house on the corner of Allison and Wagner ) We will meet one another, begin looking at some sources of information and set a schedule for future meetings. This musical drama stars a lonely wanderer, a circus performer and Esther, the shoemaker's daughter, whose family tries to marry her into a prominent family. One of the film's centerpieces is a Purim shpiel (Purim play) with its parade of costumes and music.

"The Jester's" lively circus and vaudeville music and set pieces provide a glimpse of Warsaw's then-thriving Yiddish revues and cabarets, which were destroyed soon after. Many of the film's Polish-Jewish crew and actors were killed during the Holocaust, giving the film's touches of melancholy an even more profound reading for today's audiences.

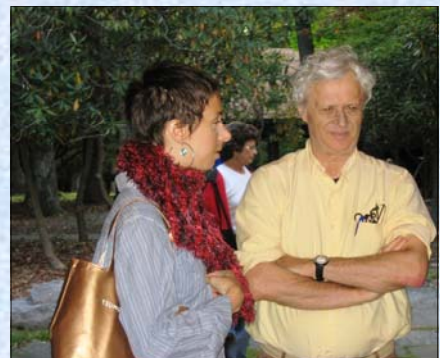
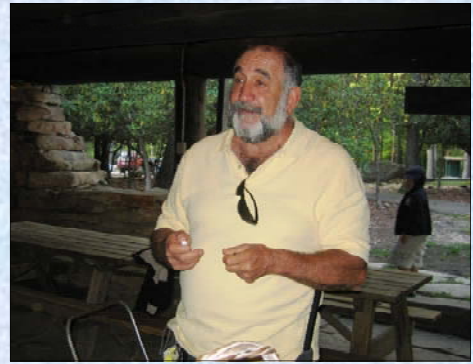
entation party. Everyone will be invited to learn how to defibrillate with us.
