# From Rabbi Feder

Passover has already passed us by and Shavuot is still a few weeks ahead. We are in the period of sefirat ha'omer, the counting of that period of fifty days between Pesach and Shavuot. The omer refers to the sheaf of barley that was brought to the Temple on the second day of Passover. From that point, seven complete weeks would be counted off and the following day, day 50, was observed as Shavuot, the Feast of Weeks. This counting mirrors the journey of our ancestors from Egypt to Sinai and the gift of Torah, another journey of 50 days.

We maintain the nightly ritual of counting, even though we no longer have the sheaves of barley, not the Temple to which to bring them, nor are we retracing their steps through the wilderness of Sinai. The period between Pesach and Shavuot though does give us the opportunity for our own journeys.

This period gives us the chance to ponder the meaning of freedom and responsibility, to review how much of Judaism we have learned and how much we still would like to know, to check out where we are in our journeys of faith and self-discovery. The act of counting reminds us that we need regular and reliable means to assess our journeys, that our Judaism isn't something that we pick up and put down as the mood strikes us, but something that we make the opportunities to integrate into our daily lives.

During this period of sefirat ha'omer, let us consider where we are in our own personal journeys, what truly counts in our own lives and on what we can be counted on.

### SHAVUOT

Shavuot is a Hebrew word meaning "weeks" and refers to the Jewish festival marking the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai. This year, Shavuot begins on Tuesday evening, May 18 and Wednesday morning, May 19. Shavuot, like so many other Jewish holidays began as an ancient agricultural festival, marking the end of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest. Shavuot was distinguished in ancient times by bringing crop offerings to the Temple in Jerusalem.

Shavuot, also known as the Festival of the Giving of the Torah, dates from biblical times, and helps to explain the holiday's name, "Weeks." The Torah tells us it took precisely forty-nine days for our ancestors to travel from Egypt to the foot of Mount Sinai (the same number of days as the Counting of the Omer ) where they were to receive the Torah. Thus, Leviticus 23:21 commands: "And you shall proclaim that day (the fiftieth day) to be a holy convocation?" The name Shavuot, "Weeks," then symbolizes the completion of a sevenweek journey.


Special customs on Shavuot are the reading of the Book of Ruth, which reminds us that we too can find a continual source of blessing in our tradition. Another tradition includes staying up all night to study Torah, a custom called *Tikkun Leil Shavuot*, which symbolizes our commitment to the Torah, and that we are always ready and awake to receive the Torah. Traditionally, dairy dishes are served on this holiday to symbolize the sweetness of the Torah, as well as the "land of milk and honey".

Our celebration of Shavuot will include services on Tuesday night, May 18, at 7:00 pm and Shavuot morning services on Wednesday, May 19, at 9:00 am. Yizkor will be recited on Shavuot morning.

### TIKKUN LEIL SHAVUOT

The imagery of Shavuot involves Israel standing at the foot of Mount Sinai, entering into a covenant with God, akin to a marriage between Israel and God or Israel and Torah. We celebrate that event each year with a tikkun leil Shavuot, an evening of study focused on the meaning of Shavuot to each of us.

This year we will utilize a special Shavuot Haggadah which will integrate study as well as celebration with different activities to create a multifaceted approach to the Shavuot. Join us as we eat, share and study Torah immediately following our erev Shavuot service.



# President's Message & 2nd Forum



Several months ago I was asked to be a candidate for the board 2010-2011. My agreement to do so was conditional: since the president conducts meetings but can't vote, I might do less damage as a president than as a board member. People looked at each other and nodded. ## Second Tree of Life Congregation Forum

The Second Tree of Life "Congregation Forum" or Town Meeting was held March 7, 2010 following the General Congregation Annual Meeting. It began with a meditation by Roz Becker and concluded with a discussion session facilitated by Board members Barry Pallay and Al Berrebi. Congregants shared their thoughts, suggestions, wants, needs and concerns regarding all aspects of the Tree of Life Synagogue. Everyone's comments were noted and the results evaluated below. There were 22 suggestions/comments from attending congregants. These fell into 6 general topic areas with most touching multiple topics. Of the comments:

- 42 % suggested ways to increase member participation
- 19 % made suggestions related to providing services to members or congregant public service.
- 16 % made programming related suggestions
- 12 % of suggestions related to rebuilding the synagogue organization such as fully staffing committees
- 5 % related to increasing membership
- 5 % touched on religious matters.

The first forum identified that 32% desired to experience and share a sense of Jewish Community, 28% desired programs to address and enhance their experience, 20% had questions rather than answers, 10% expressed concerns about the lack of young newer people and programs for them, and 6% expressed spiritual interests.

The 42% interest in increasing member participation is consistent with the 32% desire to experience and share a sense of Jewish community. Combined with the 19% related to making suggestions related to providing services and the 28% earlier desire for programs to address their interests and enhance their experience we can better focus our efforts. The next forums can build on these results and explore best ways to move forward with specific strategies and programs. General forums with larger member numbers will add to our perspective. Continuing this dialogue in itself fosters a greater sense of community as we work to make our Tree of Life a better place to meet our individual and collective needs. The results are not surprising but their value is that they come from the membership. They form a starting point. The harder difficult work is ahead of us. Please come to future forums and participate as your time and interests allow. Let us increase our numbers, continue to discuss what is on our minds, what these results mean, and where we go from here. It will take time to rebuild and revitalize with no guarantees. We are blessed with great people. If we want the Tree of Life to prosper and serve our needs everyone will need to pitch in, in their own way.
